Protect and conserve the native wildlife and its enjoyment by the public in the Upper Henrys Fork Watershed

Kestrels for Conservation

American Kestrels, or sparrow hawks, are key players in a successful growing season. North America's smallest falcon will eat many of the pests found in farm fields. Kestrels are great friends to farmers, but their numbers are declining in the U.S.

In 2022, HFWA launched the Kestrels for Conservation program with three main goals: To raise money for conservation, provide information to local farmers and landowners about how they can benefit from kestrels, and conduct fun citizen science to collect useful information about local kestrel populations.

As a part of the program, HFWA hosts familyfriendly nest box building events throughout the year in Ashton, Rexburg, and Driggs. Volunteers can come build boxes that will become new homes for kestrels.

Participants are welcome to keep the first box they build, and can build extra nest boxes, which will be sold to raise money for local conservation projects.

HFWA will provide assistance in monitoring and caring for

all nest boxes. Nest box owners can either sign up to volunteer or request that another trained volunteer check on the box periodically during nesting season to record successful nests and chicks. The collected citizen science data will be uploaded to The American Kestrel Partnership, a project by The Peregrine Fund



dedicated to monitoring kestrel populations and solving the mystery of their decline.

The nest boxes will be available for purchase at the Ashton Farmers Market on June 16th and June 23rd, and at the Driggs Farmers Market on June 30th. Teton Valley Fence Removal By Shaun Ward

Watching the water drip out of my muck boots as I turned them upside down and letting my drenched socks dry out in the sun made for a very memorable Saturday afternoon. In addition to a sunburn and torn skin, I walked away with a load of old metal and a satisfying feeling of accomplishment.

In May, HFWA worked to remove old metal fences from conservation easements in Teton Valley. These projects were in partnership with Teton Regional Land Trust, Jackson Hole Wildlife Foundation, Trout Unlimited, and Friends of the Teton River. One project removed over 1200 yards of barbed wire fencing along the Teton River, cheered on by the people floating by. Removing the old wire will provide safer river access to boaters and wildlife.



Another project removed enclosures erected 19 years ago by TRLT for the re-establishment of willows at Six Springs Ranch. Before the conservation easement, that area had experienced overgrazing, a common problem for grazed rivers and streams. Today, the willows are robust and healthy, so the enclosures were no longer needed. Members of HFWA and TRLT teamed up to take on these projects, removing the T-Posts and fencing from the willows. After hours of hard work, the teams successfully hauled away the fencing and made new friends in the process.

HFWA has partnered with local agencies and organizations to complete several fence removal projects in East Idaho. Whether it is willowenclosures or dilapidated livestock fencing, removal of unnecessary fencing is critical to improving wildlife movement and restoring habitat. In 2022 alone, HFWA volunteers removed over 5,400 ft of harmful fencing in East Idaho to help provide safer wildlife passage, and the organization is on track to remove even more this year.

Fremont County Needs A Bear-Resistant Container Ordinance

Now that grizzly and black bears are out of their dens, looking for food, and even beginning to explore neighborhoods, we are asking the County Commissioners to act to pass the proposed bearresistant trash container ordinance. As always, it is important to avoid leaving food and trash out, which attracts bears and causes conflict with people.

In May of last year five grizzlies were euthanized by Idaho Fish and Game because they became habituated to human food and posed a danger to human safety. The killing of the five bears in Island Park, and a sixth a few weeks later in a local campground, made national news. This is not what we want to be known for in Idaho!
